

An amazing fundraiser for a truly remarkable young woman

After 13-year-old Ava was diagnosed with ovarian cancer, she received treatment on St John's Ward, in Children's Health Ireland at Crumlin. Her family described her as being incredibly brave throughout her diagnosis and treatment.



Inspired by her bravery, they decided to organise an 'Abseil for Ava' fundraising event. One day in April last year, eight of her family members climbed down Dalkey Quarry.



Ava was unable to attend the abseil due to her illness, but she was extremely proud of her family's fundraising, as well as their efforts on the day. Ava came into Children's Health Foundation on the day of the cheque presentation. Her Aunty Orla said Ava was thrilled, although she couldn't take part in the abseil itself, she was delighted to be handing over a cheque for over €8,000 to Children's Health Foundation to help other sick children like herself.

Sadly, Ava died on the 17th September 2022. She was such a remarkable person with a real thirst for life. Ava brought a sparkle to everyone who met her, and she is missed immensely. We are deeply grateful to Ava and her family for raising vital funds and for allowing us to share her story.

ONE STRONG ONE-week old

How supporters like you had a life-saving impact on tiny Rosie

One-week-old Rosie had suddenly begun to cry. She was in obvious distress. Rosie's parents, Susie and JP knew she was in trouble. It was a bank holiday Monday – their GP wasn't available, so they took Rosie straight to the Paediatric Unit in the Accident & Emergency in Mullingar.

The diagnosis was a serious one: Strep B Bacterial Meningitis. Rosie was immediately sent to Children's Health Ireland at Temple Street by ambulance, with her parents following behind, completely in shock.

"We were very worried, but the staff were incredible."

Susie will never forget the experience. "We were very worried, but the staff were incredible. I knew she was in good hands. The one-on-one care around the clock that Rosie got was fabulous."

Susie recalls the stressful moment when Rosie had to go for her MRI scan. Susie waited outside, her heart in turmoil. Once the scan was completed, Susie got to hold little Rosie again.

It was good news. The MRI was all clear – the treatment had worked. You can imagine what a huge relief it was for her family.

Behind every child's story in Children's Health Ireland hospitals and urgent care centres is the

A NEW PAIGE

Born with a congenital heart defect, little Paige's life hung in the balance

When Rhona learned that her baby daughter Paige had been born with a rare congenital heart defect, she was devastated. But the medical team

in Children's Health Ireland at Crumlin quickly went to work, providing Paige with the life-saving treatment she urgently needed.

"Only for the Children's Heart Centre in Children's Health Ireland at Crumlin, her surgeons, cardiology team and nurses our beautiful girl wouldn't be here today."

The first days of new motherhood can be intense and disorienting at the best of times, but Paige's serious heart condition made this a terrifying time for Rhona. She recalls, "when Paige was first diagnosed it was so scary, at that early stage we didn't know how everything would turn out."

"The staff were just amazing, I will never forget what they did for us."

With everything that was going on, Rhona and her partner found the care and reassurance of the staff at Children's Health Ireland at Crumlin made a huge difference. "The medical terms were all new to us, but the nurses and doctors explained everything and made sure that we understood what would be happening. They really prepared us for what was to come.

"Paige was in ICU for five days after her surgery and was then brought back to the ward. The staff were just amazing, I will never forget what they did for us."

Once it became clear that Paige was through the worst, her parents felt an immense sense of relief. "I remember when the medical team were getting her ready to be discharged, the tubes and wires surrounding her started to be slowly



removed, it was great for us as a family to see," says Rhona.

Rhona remembers being especially touched by how invested the Children's Health Ireland at Crumlin team were in her daughter's recovery. "The staff were just as delighted for her; it was like they were really in it with us." Rhona feels that her family's experience in Children's Health Ireland at Crumlin will always stay with her. "You can be completely oblivious to what goes on in the hospital when you are not in the situation but afterwards your mindset completely changes."



IT'S all about heart

Paediatric Cardiologist Dr. Orla Franklin talks about her work caring for the littlest of hearts

In Ireland every year, 500 children are born with a heart problem. My job is to carry out scans and try to identify what is wrong with a child's heart, then to work with my colleagues to see what we can do to help

make them better. Every aspect of my work is positively influenced by the generosity of people who kindly donate to Children's Health Foundation.

When I'm in the clinic I devote a lot of my energy to working with the parents as well as the child. It's such a scary time, so I do all I can to help parents understand their child's condition and the treatments we're proposing. It's all about building relationships and trust.

Many of the children we see would not survive without the care we provide. The most rewarding aspect of the job is seeing a family like Paige's – who you know have been under the most extraordinary stress coping with their sick child – come back to you when the child is a toddler, with an excellent quality of life and enjoying day-to-day activities that are no different to any other child.

Wally and The Warriors

In June 2022, a group of 12 friends who call themselves Wally's Warriors took on the ultimate Irish relay, running non-stop the length of Ireland!

These amazing runners raised more than €50,000 towards music therapy in Children's Health Ireland at Crumlin.

They followed a course that ran from Malin Head, Donegal to Mizen Head, Cork – that's a daunting 569km. The team started training in January and clocked up almost 10,000km in preparation for the challenge.

The reason for this crazy trek? To raise funding for Music Therapy in Children's Health Ireland at Crumlin.

Music Therapy is an evidence-based profession that uses music to help patients reach health goals. Music Therapists like Susan Hurley (see p.3) have specialised Master's level training in the application of music to the therapeutic process, especially in acute paediatric care. Working as part of a multidisciplinary team, they can help children use creativity and self-expression to work towards emotional, social, physical and cognitive goals.

With their amazing run, Wally's Warriors raised an incredible €51,283 – a sum that should sustain the Music Therapy programme at Children's Health Ireland at Crumlin for two years. Music to our ears!

RUNNING FOR Childrens' lives

Why super-dad Dean ran the Dublin marathon to raise vital funds for sick children

When his daughter Bella-Rose began complaining of headaches, Dean Delaney had no idea the difficult journey that lay ahead for him and his family.

He took Bella-Rose to the opticians for an eye exam, during which a swelling was found at the back of her optic nerve. She went into hospital for CT and MRI scans, after which she was transferred to St Gabriel's neurology ward in Children's Health Ireland at Temple Street.

"Neurology and neurosurgery were not words we had heard before," says Dean, recalling this frightening time. "We were met by her neurosurgeon Dr. Crimmins, who explained to us that Bella-Rose had a brain tumour in her cerebellum. Words we will never forget."

Bella-Rose underwent brain surgery to have the tumour removed. Dean says, "It was the longest day of our lives, she spent seven hours in surgery and was then transferred to ICU. Our Bella-Rose, as dramatic as always, was cracking jokes, slagging the doctors and smiling. For the first time in months, she looked like herself again. The black bags under her eyes were gone and she was no longer in pain. Our beautiful daughter was back."



Dean is deeply thankful to the Children's Health Ireland at Temple Street team – and to supporters like you – for giving his daughter a new lease on life. To show his thanks, he ran the Dublin City Marathon in October and raised a whopping €19,030 to support St. Gabriel's Ward in Children's Health Ireland at Temple Street.
